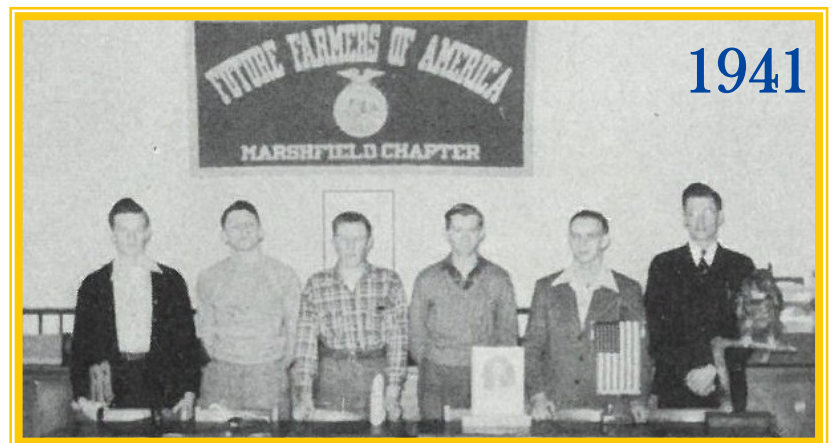

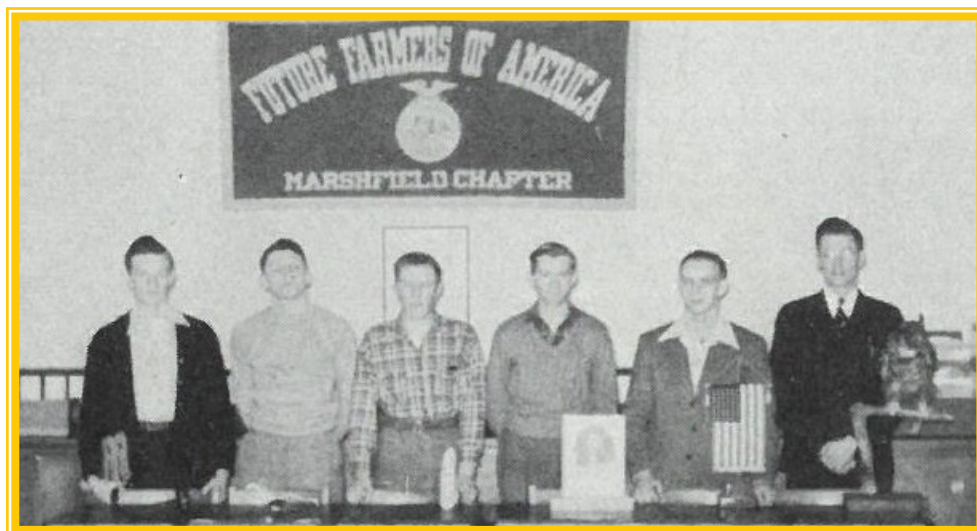

MARSHFIELD AGRICULTURE AND FFA HISTORY

Although 2016 marks the 75th anniversary of Marshfield High School's official FFA charter and the 100th year of agriculture education in the school district, the roots of both actually run deeper.

Contemporary evidence shows that a single agriculture class was an elective as far back as 1905. The class was taught by science teachers, who were frequently women. In 1916, the Agriculture Course, or program of study, was established and a dedicated agriculture teacher hired. Agriculture became a vocational course of study following the passage of the 1917 Smith-Hughes Act.

An organized Agriculture Club began in the spring of 1918. In 1922, the name of the club changed to the Blue Feather Agriculture Club and the group established a clear mission to improve farming and farm life. Members also successfully competed in many state judging contests.



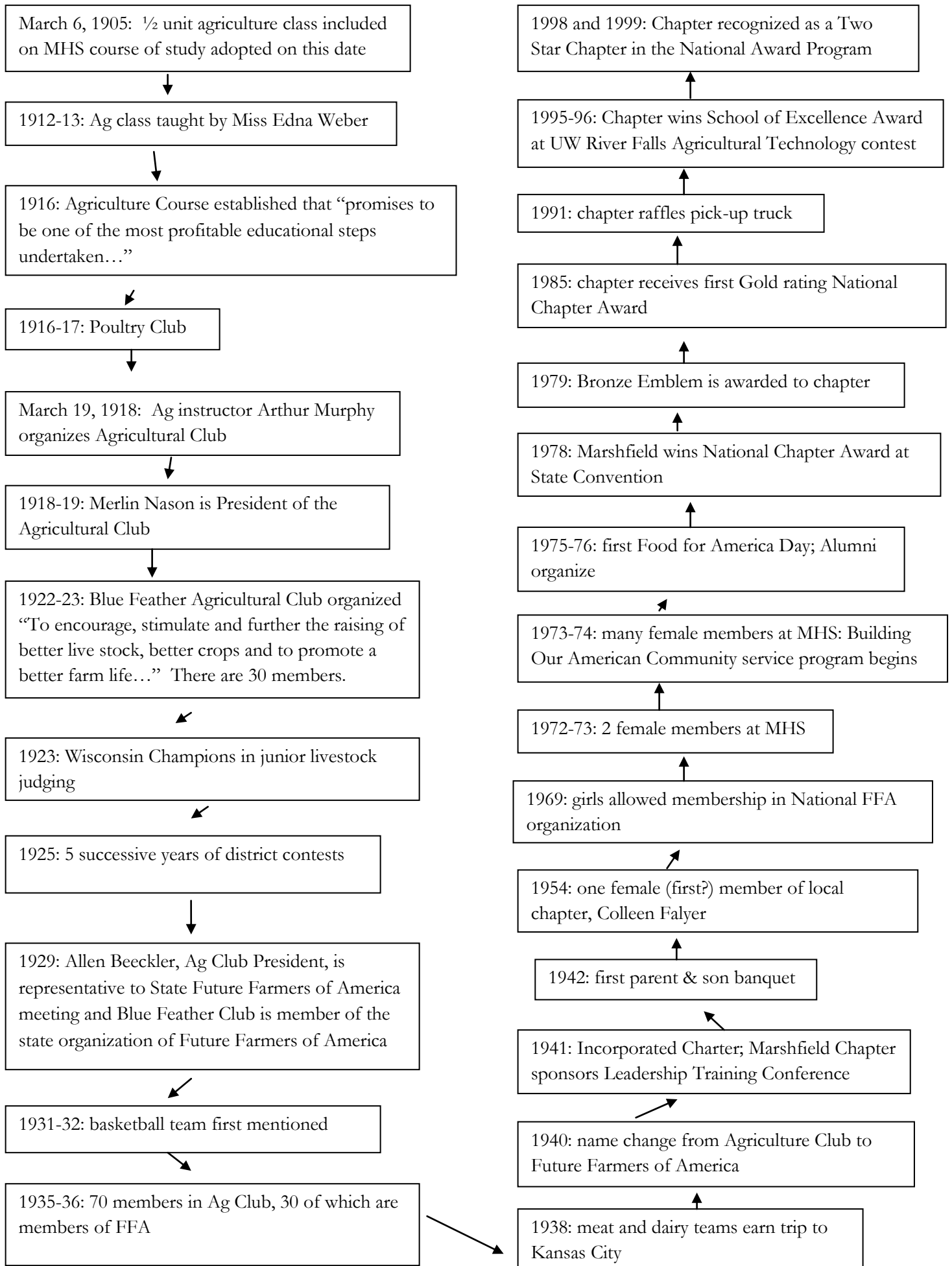
Evidence suggests Marshfield High School Blue Feather Agricultural Club was granted a charter by the Wisconsin Association of FFA in 1929, but a copy of this charter has not been found. The same year, MHS was first represented at a state FFA meeting. Although the Agriculture Club had a growing membership, not all participants were members of FFA.

In 1940, the MHS Agricultural Club finally changed its name to Future Farmers of America. The chapter's incorporated charter was granted in 1941 and the first "parent and son" banquet held in 1942. Girls were allowed membership in the national organization in 1969, but the local MHS chapter did have one female member in 1954. In 1972, there were just two female members, but that number greatly expanded the following year.

Future Farmers' Leadership Conference



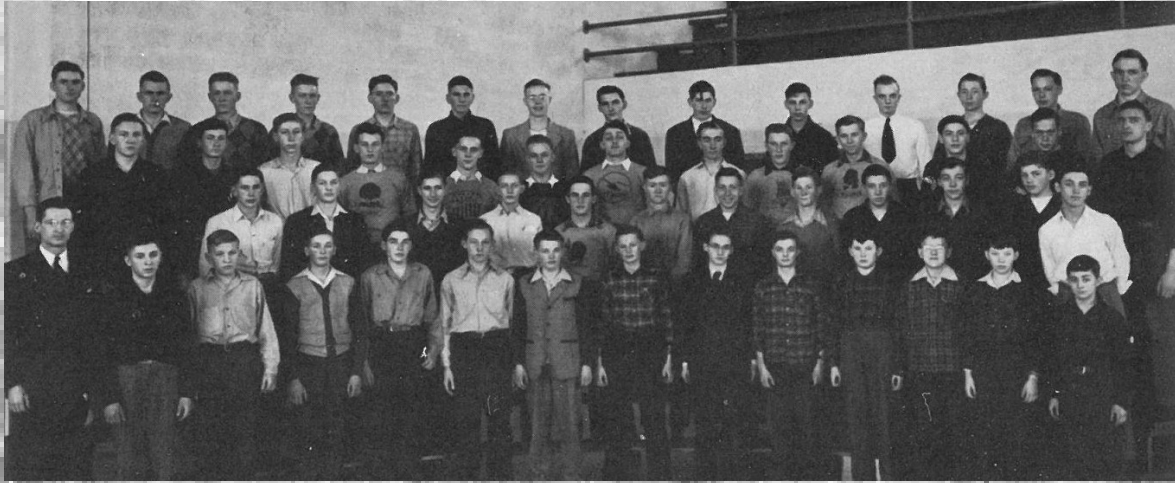
The Agricultural Club for 1940-41 has an enrollment of one hundred boys. These boys participate in an active program of events held throughout the year. The first event was the state agricultural contest held at Madison on October 4, 5. Marshfield entered eight teams, each composed of three members, in the following fields of competition; crops, potatoes, apples, dairy cattle, live stock, dairy products, meats, and farm mechanics. Twenty-five hundred boys from two hundred twenty high schools competed in these contests. The Marshfield Teams received a rating of "superior" (upper 10%) in meats, crops, and dairy products; a rating of "good" (second 20%) in dairy cattle and livestock; and in farm mechanics a rating of creditable (third 20%). The meat team was named first in the state. Jerome Spindler placed first in individual cheese scoring.

In cooperation with the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, the Agriculture Club sponsored a colt show in September. With the help of the same organization, a rural school crops-judging contest was held, in which twenty-six schools participated. On March 4, the Marshfield Chapter of the Future Farmers of America, in cooperation with the Wisconsin Association, sponsored a "Leadership Training Conference," for other chapters of Central Wisconsin. Four hundred nineteen members from sixteen schools attended.

The club members are engaged in many different kinds of work. Fifty are members of the Future Farmers of America. Twenty-five are kept busy weighing, testing, and recording the progress of their home dairy herds. Thirty-five boys have swine and sheep projects, and the majority of this group show their stock in fairs at Chippewa Falls, La Crosse, Wausau, Neillsville, Milwaukee, and Marshfield. In addition, the members are active in such enterprises and projects as small fruit and orchard improvement, hybrid corn, pedigreed grains, vegetables, soil testing, fertilizing and liming, dairy cattle, bees, and poultry. Seventy per cent of the boys are members and leaders in 4-H Clubs in Clark, Marathon, and Wood Counties.

The plow signifies labor and tillage of the soil, the backbone of agriculture and the historic foundation of our country's strength.



The eagle is a national symbol which serves as a reminder of our freedom and ability to explore new horizons for the future of agriculture.



The owl, long recognized for its wisdom, symbolizes the knowledge required to be successful in the industry of agriculture.

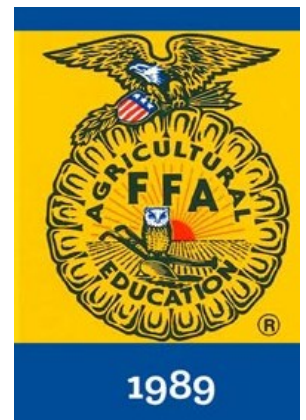
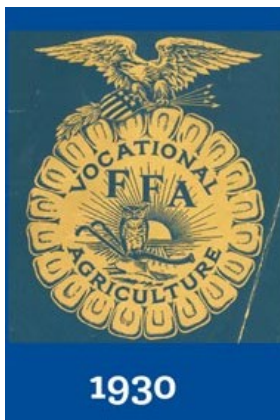

History of the FFA Emblem

Using features from the Future Farmers of Virginia, the FFA emblem was adopted by delegates to the first national convention of the Future Farmers of America in 1928. Changes have been made over the years with the most significant in 1989 when the words “vocational agriculture” were replaced by “agricultural education”.



The National FFA Organization has updated the FFA emblem. While it retains the basic character of the original emblem dating back to 1928, the 2015 version has been digitally enhanced to more clearly define the eagle, owl, shield, plow and arrows. The wings of the eagle have been made more symmetrical while the rays of the sun and kernels of corn are equally proportioned. In addition, the registered trademark symbol is now within the border of the ear of corn.

NFA and FFA Merge

The New Farmers of America was an agricultural organization for African-American students prior to the merger of NFA with FFA in 1965.

Like FFA, the NFA was founded in Virginia. Three individuals who were instrumental in starting the organization were G.W. Owens and J.R. Thomas, teacher educators in agricultural education at Virginia State College who co-wrote a constitution and bylaws for the New Farmers of Virginia, and Dr. H.O. Sargent, a federal agricultural education official who conceived the idea of the New Farmers of America Organization.

Male Official Dress

- Black dress pants. (No jeans - blue or black, leather, pleather, etc.)
- White dress shirt and official FFA tie
- Black dress shoes with a closed heel and toe. (No boots, sandals, open-toed shoes, tennis shoes.)
- Black socks.
- Official FFA jacket zipped to the top and tucked in.

Female Official Dress

- Black skirt. Skirt is to be at least knee length, hemmed evenly across the bottom, with a slit no longer than 2 inches above the knee, excluding the kick pleat. Black slacks may be appropriate for traveling and outdoor activities.
- White collared blouse and official FFA blue scarf.
- Black dress shoes with a closed heel and toe (No boots, sandals, open-toed shoes, or tennis shoes.)
- NUDE color nylon hosiery.
- Official FFA jacket zipped to the top and tucked in.

Proper Use of the FFA Jacket

1. The jacket is to be worn only by members.
2. The jacket should be kept clean and neat.
3. The back of the jacket should have only a large official FFA emblem, the name of the state and the name of the local chapter, region, district or area. The front of the jacket should have only a small official FFA emblem, the name of the individual, one office or honor and the year of that office or honor.
4. The jacket should be worn on official occasions with the zipper fastened to the top. The collar should be turned down and the cuffs buttoned.
5. The jacket should be worn by members and officers on all official FFA occasions, as well as other occasions where the chapter or state association is represented. It may be worn to school and other appropriate places.
6. The jacket should only be worn to places that are appropriate for members to visit.
7. School letters and insignia of other organizations should not be attached to or worn on the jacket.
8. When the jacket becomes faded and worn, it should be discarded or the emblems and lettering removed.
9. The emblems and lettering should be removed if the jacket is given or sold to a non-member.
10. A member should act professionally when wearing the FFA jacket.
11. Members should refrain from use of tobacco and alcohol when underage at all times when representing the FFA. In addition, members should exhibit their leadership qualities when they encounter substances including tobacco and alcohol and serve to discourage others from inappropriate behavior.
12. All chapter degree, officer and award medals should be worn beneath the name on the right side of the jacket, with the exception that a single State FFA Degree charm or American FFA Degree key should be worn above the name or attached to a standard key chain. No more than three medals should be worn on the jacket. These should represent the highest degree earned, the highest office held and the highest award earned by the member. No more than three medals should be worn on the jacket.

Parliamentary Procedure

The purpose of parliamentary procedure is to promote efficient meetings so that business can be transacted in an orderly manner.

Each chapter member should know how to conduct and take part in a meeting in order to protect the rights of all members. A knowledge of parliamentary procedure not only strengthens chapter meetings but also provides members with valuable leadership

tools for participation in the chapter, community and other organizations.

Chapter officers, in particular, need to know the rules of parliamentary procedure.

Observing parliamentary procedure will ensure that:

- 1) One item is addressed at a time.
- 2) Courtesy is extended to everyone.
- 3) The majority rules.
- 4) The rights of the minority are protected.

Knowledge of parliamentary procedure becomes a life-long asset, valuable for leading or participating in meetings in an informed and efficient way. At the chapter level, officers and members find it much easier to conduct and take part in meetings when supported by a background of parliamentary knowledge.

How to Wear Awards

- ♦ Chapter degree, officer and award medals should be worn beneath the name on the right side of the jacket.
- ♦ State FFA Degree or American Degree keys should be worn above the name on the right side of the jacket or attached to a standard key chain.
- ♦ No more than three medals should be worn on the jacket. These should represent the highest degree earned, highest office held and the highest award earned.

The FFA Jacket: A Global Effort



Did you know your FFA jacket traveled the world before you ever put it on? It takes multiple countries to make the official FFA jacket happen and to keep the cost around \$50—the price it has remained for the past 20 years, thanks to global sourcing. Here are some fast facts about the official FFA jacket:

- ♦ The fabric is made of U.S. Cotton
- ♦ The raw cotton is shipped to china, where it is woven and dyed
- ♦ The finished cotton is moved to two manufacturing facilities—one in Vietnam and the other in Ohio, where the jackets are cut and sewn, and emblems are attached.
- ♦ Each jacket uses 1.6 yards of fabric. More than 110,000 yards of fabric are used annually.
- ♦ All jackets are personalized at Universal Lettering Co. in Ohio.
- ♦ 50,000 jackets are imported, 20,000 are made domestically.
- ♦ 70,000 jackets are sold annually.
- ♦ The jacket underwent restoration from 2003 to 2005 to establish a new standard of blue, restore the design and color of the emblem, improve the fit and comfort, and increase its durability.

The Creation of the FFA Jacket



The jacket was first created by an FFA Chapter from Fredericktown, Ohio. In 1933, the Fredericktown FFA band performed at the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, and they wanted to wear something in addition to the dress shirt and trousers of the official FFA uniform back then. The group opted for a corduroy jacket that would unify and evoke pride in the band members, not knowing their new uniform would become a national FFA tradition. Eighty years later, the jacket continues to instill a sense of pride and belonging in all who wear it.
